

When our neighbors in need come to Community Action House, we listen to their struggles, offer support, and often provide them with a solution to their most immediate and pressing need: **hunger**. For most, all of this takes less than an hour, start to finish, like it did for one guest who recently came in after unexpected housing expenses endangered an already precariously stretched budget. He'd been slowly watching the food on his shelves wane away, trying to ration the last two cans until payday on Friday. In the 3 days before coming to us, he'd consumed nothing but water. When we met him, he was feeling ill

He makes over \$1,800 a month, enough to survive, but not enough with his ongoing medical expenses, nor enough to save for a rainy day. He walked the twelve blocks to see us. He's employed full time.

He shared gratitude for the food he was able to choose from the food pantry shelves, the variety, the care. Milk, eggs, fresh produce, cans of vegetables, spaghetti sauce, and much more. Plenty enough food to last until payday. You'd think he was leaving the grocery store on a normal day. We haven't

seen that particular guest again, which to us is a good sign. We're humbled to be trusted enough that people will choose to come for help. Before leaving, he shared his deep gratitude, and said that **he hoped** to give back some day. It happens quite often that we find a bag or box of food dropped at our door when we first arrive. It's giving back. Namelessly, and without thanks. We're beyond grateful, because we know what it really means.

FOOD SECURITY



When Susan first came to Community Action House in 2018, she was just getting out of an abusive relationship of over 10 years. Without the support of a community around her, she had floundered in her relationships and career, always struggling to connect. At CAH, she enrolled in the EPIC Empowerment **Program**, where she found the support she needed, both from an intensive curriculum that challenged her to see value in herself, and by sharing and growing with her fellow classmates. Five months later, she carried a renewed sense of self and

During her graduation speech, she shared that her gratitude to the program was for the opportunities she was ready to take on in life. "My struggles don't define who I am - they make me stronger and open to new opportunities." She also surprised the crowd by annoucing that she'd been accepted into college for a bachelor's degree program, ready to pursue her dreams and move forward and change. CONNECTION

Brad & Linda first connected with Community Action House after hearing about the **Community Kitchen** from a friend. Living without a vehicle, they walked five miles for the chance at a free meal. Living without a home, they were staying in a tent, while their three young children stayed with a close family member. They had recently lived together in an apartment, but were evicted as rents increased year after year, while the pay from their jobs did not.

At the Community Kitchen, they found more than a meal. They connected with Angela, **Homeless Outreach Specialist**, who listened to their struggles and took action, starting the process for a housing voucher. When crisis erupted between the family member hosting their children, Angela and CAH staff went with Brad and Linda to pick up the children and bring them to a hotel. They were connected with local churches who covered the hotel stay as they navigated the crisis.

Brad and Linda continue to have people walking alongside them as they navigate these challenges. They are connected with trained professionals and a community of support. They were not alone when they needed help most. Community Action House strives to provide interconnected services to our most vulnerable and disconnected neighbors, and to provide the connections imperative to improving each individual's and family's situation.




